As we come to a close of the 2020-21 Rotary Year, the year associated with COVID-19 and significant changes in the way we do business, your Membership Committee is thrilled to say, in spite of the challenges, our Club gained 19 incredible, motivated and highly energized new members. As promised, we changed the way new members are inducted, including sponsor introductions of the inductees and family/friend attendance, as well as engaged more existing members in the orientation process. Three of our new members had the special honor of being inducted by our District Governor. With thoughtful pairings, the Mentorship program furthered the opportunities for new members to become engaged in Club activities and service.

The current RI theme 'Rotary Opens Opportunities' caused us to think of the opportunities we have when it comes to Membership. Once we started hybrid meetings, members reached out and 23 guests were invited to join us for lunch, each of whom received a personal email thanking them for coming and three becoming new members.
