Beast Feast 2022: Las Vegas Alumni Group Re-Establishes Enrichment Efforts for Current Clients

The WestCare Nevada Alumni Handbook states that, "The basis behind the Alumni is to give all of WestCare's graduates an opportunity to stay connected through a support group of individuals with a common goal - recovery." In addition, it continues by identifying that, "one of the keys to recovery is the willingness to be of service to those individuals who are seeking recovery and give back what was freely given to us. We accomplish this goal by hosting several events a year at WestCare Nevada's facilities, allowing all graduates the opportunity to share their experience, strength, and hope with the residents and show them that we can maintain our sobriety and have fun in recovery."

Well, that certainly became a challenge over the past couple of years as the COVID-19 pandemic kept outside visitors, including our alumni, from entering our residential facilities. This month, however, a modified version of one of the typical events took place and it was nothing short of a success. This year's "Beast Feast," which included less alumni attendees and which required a negative COVID test the day of the event, went off without a hitch at both Harris Springs Ranch and the Women and Children's Campus the following day. BBQ (*Steak and ribs*), side dishes, outside games, and an outdoor meeting is how the days' events went, and it was evident that this was a long-time-coming based on the overall reaction by both clients and alumni.

When we consider the benefit of positive social interaction, undoubtedly one of the most important aspects is improved mental health. At WestCare Nevada, we have joined many organizations and clubs in the community that have opened the door to countless ideas and opportunities. By joining like-minded organizations, we are able to network with professionals and leaders, further enhance our skills, and gain experience in communication organization and team building.

his month, I'd like to discuss the **Nevada Housing Coalition (NHC)** and how instrumental they are in finding a place to sleep for our unhoused brothers and sisters. WestCare joined the coalition two years ago and the many relationships that we have built since then have been priceless. Every year, they host the **Nevada Housing Conference** in which they bring many different organizations, advocates, and ideas together. Our team is proud to say that we have been to all of them since their inception!

Per their website, the NHC's mission is to, "Create sustainable solutions to community awareness, capacity building, and advocacy to ensure housing options for all Nevadans." Their mission statement continues, "Every state in the U.S. lacks a sufficient supply of affordable housing for the lowest income residents, but Nevadans, more than any other state population, face the greatest challenge in finding affordable and available homes." According to the <u>National Low Income Housing Coalition's</u> 2022 <u>GAP Report</u>, there are only 18 affordable and available rental homes for every 100 extremely low-income renter households in Nevada.

WestCare is a part of the coalition and has many community benefits. According to the NHC website, "communities thrive when people have access to stable high-quality affordable housing. Pathways to economic mobility become achievable as education, health outcomes, safety rates, and overall engagements improve. Neighborhoods and communities become stronger and more secure, and in short, everyone benefits."

As described on their website, the NHC is "Committed to raising awareness and building the capacity of our communities to create high-quality dignified and attainable houses for all Nevadans." **Congresswoman Susie Lee** addressed the lack of affordable housing in the state and advanced solutions for all Nevadans during a recent roundtable discussion. "Our underserved communities' low-income households are seniors, Veterans, workers, and children – they are all of us. Together, we will work to ensure that every Nevadan has a safe and stable place to call home," said Lee.

In the last two years, I have seen so much growth in our coalition and appreciate being a part of this movement. I had the pleasure of working with Executive Director of the NHC, Christine Hess. Christine holds a certification from the National Development Council as an Economic Development Finance Professional. She works alongside Communications and Outreach Coordinator, Amanda Lakin. Amanda is tasked with engaging NHC members and nonmembers across Nevada's diverse affordable housing ecosystem. Lastly, their Project and Grant Coordinator, Juawana Grant, works on statewide capacity building. Juawana previously worked in permanent supportive housing.

The next housing conference will be held at Peppermill Reno Oct. 19 - 20. If you would like to get involved, their newest program is called **ElevateNV**. This affordable housing capacity building initiative was made possible by a grant from the Federal Loan Bank of San Francisco.

The goal of ElevateNV is to build the overall capacity of Nevada-based organizations to expand affordable housing for those who need it most. Interested funders, developers, housing and service providers, and government and tribal officials are welcome to attend their Supportive Housing Academy sessions, Affordable Housing development training, and Project Catalyst program with the goal of assessing readiness and sharing knowledge about housing solutions to create more opportunities for supportive housing in Nevada.
